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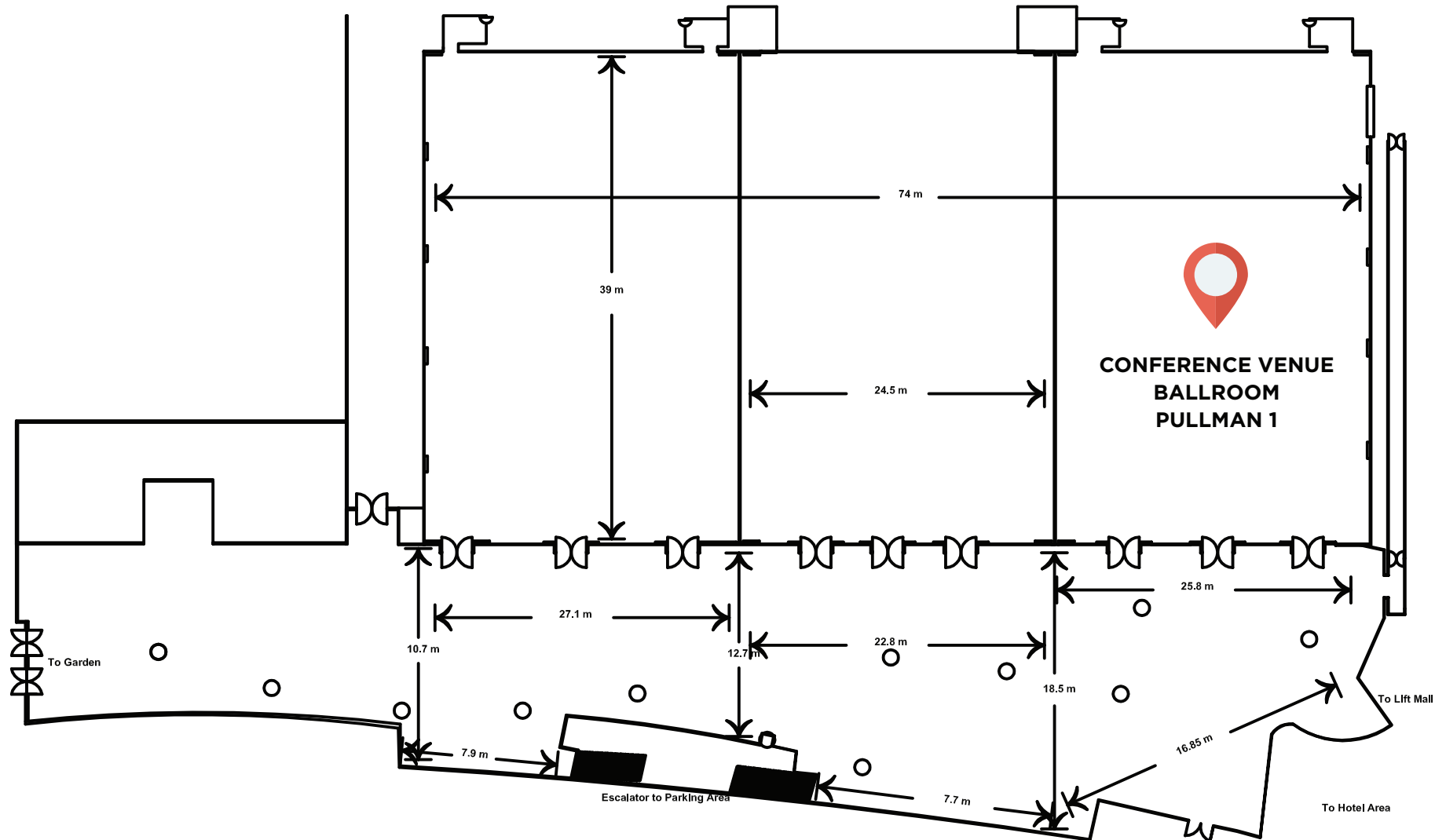

16:45	–	18:15	<p>D1: Civil Society & Democratization: Special Panel – Third Sector Governance in Asia <i>This panel examines the issue of governance for non-profits/ third sector organisations in Asia. In this we return to the large research completed and published by Springer in 2008, with funding from the Ford Foundation (Hasan and Onyx, 2008). That research was carried out by a team of researchers from across the Asian region as well as researchers from UTS. If the research came to one conclusion it was to problematize governance in the various cultural contexts of Asian countries. We found a variety of forms of governance in operation, all of which carried some kind of risk or problem. So the question remains, “what is an appropriate form of governance for third sector organisations in this region?” We re-examine this question some 10 years after the original research, with fresh empirical evidence and further reflection. We particularly invite the audience here to join us in this question, by offering other exemplars of good or inappropriate governance patterns, and offering commentary on our thinking.</i></p> <p>1.
